

#### **Eligible Services**

- □ Four categories of eligible services
  - Category One
    - Data Transmission and/or Internet Access
  - □ Category 2
    - Internal Connections
    - Basic Maintenance of Internal Connections
    - Managed Internal Broadband Services



#### Eligible Services

#### □ Category One

- Data Transmission and/or Internet Access
  - Services needed to support broadband connectivity to schools and libraries. Includes services that provide broadband to eligible locations including data links that connect multiple points, service used to connect eligible locations to the Internet, and services that provide basic conduit access to the Internet.
  - Voice Services are NOT eligible.
  - With limited exceptions Hot Spots are NOT eligible.



#### Eligible Services

#### □ Category Two

- Internal Connections, Basic Maintenance of Internal Connections, and Managed Internal Broadband Connections
  - The internal connections needed for broadband connectivity within schools and libraries. Support is limited to the internal connections necessary to bring broadband into, and provide it throughout, schools and libraries; and basic maintenance of these connections, as well as services that manage and operate owned or leased broadband internal connections.
  - End user equipment computers, monitors, cell phones or phone sets are NOT eligible



## New for Funding Year 2021

- Category 2 Budgets
  - Reset for FY 2021 2022, Budgets are fixed over five years
  - Calculated District-wide and Library System-wide
  - □ Budget Floor increases to \$25,000 per site
  - Multiplication Factor \$167 per student and \$4.50 square foot for libraries
- Equipment Transfer Rules Relaxed
  - Intra-agency transfer allowed without notifying USAC
- Prohibition on Huawei and ZTE





#### Children's Internet Protection Act


- Applicants must enforce a policy of Internet safety and certify compliance with CIPA
  - Internet Safety Policy
    - Access by minors to inappropriate matter on the Internet and World Wide Web
    - The safety and security of minors when using electronic mail, chat rooms, and other forms of direct electronic communications
    - Unauthorized access including "hacking" and other unlawful activities by minors online
    - Unauthorized disclosure, use, and dissemination of personal information regarding minors
    - Measures designed to restrict minors' access to materials harmful to minors

Starting in FY 2012 the CIPA rules were updated to include a requirement to provide for educating minors about appropriate online behavior, including interacting with other individuals on social networking websites and in chat rooms, cyberbullying awareness, and response

- Technology Protection Measure
- Public Notice or Hearing Meeting

## Top Denial Reasons

- Competitive Bidding Violation
- Did Not Request Services on FCC Form 470
- Services Were Not Cost Effective
- Did Not Provide Responses or Provided Insufficient Response
- Services Requested Were Ineligible
- Contract Does Not Meet Program Requirements



- □ Form 470-Services Requested
  - Filed by applicants to define desired services and open the competitive bidding process
  - Must be posted in USAC's E-Rate Productivity Center (EPC) portal for at least 28 days before a service provider is selected and/or before signing a contract
  - Request for Proposals (RFPs) are issued concurrently with the Form 470
    - RFP documents, addenda, and question and answers must be uploaded to the 470 in EPC



- □ Competitive Bidding
  - Process must be open and fair
  - All bidders must be treated the same
  - Vendors may not have advance knowledge
  - Equal access to information
  - Clear Specifications <u>"or equivalent"</u>
  - No gifts from service providers
  - No free services
  - Follow all rules FCC and state/local
- □ Primary Factor Price of ELIGIBLE goods and services
  - Most cost-effective offering must be selected



#### **Bid Evaluation**

- Price of eligible goods and services must be the primary/most heavily weighted factor
- □ If utilizing a multi tiered evaluation process, the price of the eligible goods and services must be the primary factor in all tiers
- □ Most cost-effective bid/proposal must be selected
  - Price of eligible goods and services must be the primary factor
  - Other factors, including other price factors (e.g., ineligible items/services, training), past experience, references, technical ability, etc., may be considered but cannot be weighted equally or higher that the cost of eligible goods and services



## Contracts

- □ RFP/Contract/Procurement Documents
  - Alignment of Documents
    - RFP
    - Bid Evaluations
    - Award Notifications
    - Board Approval
    - Signed Contract
  - Contract Award versus Signing
    - Contract must be signed and dated, or a "legally binding agreement" in place prior to submitting the Form 471
  - Optional extensions must be formally exercised prior to submitting the 471



- □ Form 471-Services Ordered
  - Discount Calculation Information
  - Product/Services information (cost, quantities, contract information)
    - Entities Serviced
  - Certifications



#### **Document Retention**

All applicants and service providers are required to retain receipt and delivery records relating to the technology plans, pre-bidding, bidding, contracts, application process, invoices, provision of services, and other matters relating to the administration of the Universal Service Fund for a period of at least ten (10) years from last date of service.



### **Document Retention**

#### **Example**

If a service provider provides Internet access to an applicant for Funding Year 2015 (July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016), both the applicant and the service provider must retain all records on this transaction until at least June 30, 2026.

## E-rate: Funding Year 2020/Year 23 Status

- FY2020 commitments as of 10/12/20:
  - C1: **\$1.2B** (\$1.77B requested)
  - C2: **\$551M** (\$1.14B requested)
    - Wave 24 Application still Pending? Contact USAC for status

- "Second" filing window for FY2020:
  - \$14.8M requested (\$21.2 pre-discount)
  - Deadline 10/16/20



## Dec 2019 FCC Report and Order E-rate 5 Year Budget Caps

- E-rate requests for <u>Category 2</u> funding are subject to budget caps over a five year period; there are no caps for Category 1
  - ➤ <u>NEW</u>: The 5 year 'clock' starts in E-rate Funding Year 2021/Year 24 and runs through 2025. The 5 year period <u>resets</u> every five years; there is no carryover.
  - > NEW: Budget caps are managed at the school district or library system level!!!
    - For schools:
    - \$167/student on a pre-discount basis (FY20) for schools
    - For libraries:
    - \$4.50 per square foot (rural or urban)
  - ➤ <u>NEW</u>: Minimum 'floor' increased for E-rate 5 yr budget cap NOW \$25,000



## E-rate: Funding Year 2021/Year 24 Procurement

- 970 Forms 470 posted as of 10/12
  - ➤ 816 Category One
  - ➤ 235 Category Two

- No word on final Eligible Services List for FY2021
  - Expected late November; major changes are *unlikely*

- Form 471 Filing Window
  - Expect after 1/1/21 through end of March 2021

### CASE STUDY: PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY LIBRARY SYSTEM



#### Overview:

- 12 branches with Manassas coming online in 2020
- Proprietary library hardware and software
- New Cloud applications as part of modernization effort

#### Objective:

- Focus on delivering 2019-2023 Strategic Plan
- Prioritize improved Wi-Fi access
- Collaborate with Department of Information Technology

#### Solution:

- Category 1 Fiber connectors, Comcast service until move to a centralized ISP
- Category 2 Forklift upgrade of network switches, wireless controllers, AP's, cabling service
- Used E-Rate Central through Library of Virginia contract



#### Advice:

- To modernize your infrastructure use E-Rate to offset cost. Do not forget recurring costs.
- Partner and leverage the IT team's expertise to make sure your vision aligns with their goals
- Hire a consultant to help navigate the USAC system
- Attend USAC training
